

Ed Bearss Speaks at Annual Meeting

Members of the Central Virginia Battlefields Trust gathered in Fredericksburg during the first weekend in May for its annual meeting. They toured area battlefields, visited the places that they had been instrumental in preserving, and examined battlefields that still need to be preserved. The integrity of the May 1 battlefield at Chancellorsville, for instance, remains threatened despite a recent success in preventing it from being rezoned for dense development. The highlight of the annual meeting itself, however, was the incomparable Ed Bearss.

Ed spoke about his first visits to the Fredericksburg area battlefields, comparing their condition then and now. In the early 1960s, the National Park's holdings at places like Chancellorsville and the Wilderness consisted of thin ribbons of land along trench lines. The areas in between were in private ownership and would be susceptible to development when new highways made them accessible. Efforts since then have preserved many hundreds of acres of critical terrain. The battlefields look better than ever, with many previous gaps carefully acquired and protected, but the threat to many other sections of this hallowed ground is still extremely high. Ed noted that the train has passed some places by. The exceptionally intact battlefield at Shiloh comes to mind. At Fredericksburg, however, he warned that the freight train is thundering down.

During the question and answer period, someone asked Ed which battlefield site was his favorite. Diplomatically, he responded that there were favorite places at every battle-



field. At Fredericksburg, the Stone Wall and the Willis Hill area (that was the CVBT's first preservation victory) are tremendously evocative.

Who, he asked, could not be moved by looking across the ground where Union ranks had been decimated by accu-

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CVBT Changes Leadership

rate Confederate fire. At Chancellorsville, Ed noted that he always enjoyed visiting the site of Lee and Jackson's final meeting (near the CVBT acquisition known as McLaws' Wedge). At the Wilderness, the chosen site was the scene of the first "Lee to the rear" incident. During one of Ed's early tours to that site, one of the attendees was shocked to learn that the Tapp field was still in private ownership and promptly committed himself to acquiring it for inclusion in the National Park. That level of interest and selfless



dedication is evident in many of our CVBT members today and it is humbling to be in their presence. Finally, the Bloody Angle, at Spotsylvania Court House, drew out Ed's admiration for those who had endured the endless hours of close combat.

As always, Ed Bearss was inspiring and encouraged us to press on with acquiring the ground that had helped to define America.



CVBT creates award to honor Ralph Happel

In April of this year, the Central Virginia Battlefields Trust was surprised and extremely pleased to receive a \$150,000 donation from the estate of the late Ralph Happel.

Mr. Happel, a long time historian with the Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania National Military Park, recognized the unique historical value of our area and had directed that a portion of his estate be used to support CVBT's efforts.

To honor the work and perpetuate the memory of Ralph Happel, the Central Virginia Battlefields Trust has established the Ralph Happel Award.

Mrs. Opal Ritchie, executor of the estate, joined us at this year's Annual Meeting as we announced the estab-


lishment of this award.

The award will be presented annually to an individual or group to recognize outstanding contributions to preservation issues in the Central Virginia area.

A native of Fredericksburg, Virginia, Ralph Happel led a distinguished career as historian and author with the Fredericksburg & Spotsylvania National Military Park from 1936 until his retirement in 1972.

A graduate of James Monroe High School in Fredericksburg, he received his undergraduate and graduate degrees from the University of Virginia.

During the Great Depression, he headed the local Writer's Project un-

der the Works Progress Administration (WPA), researching many of the lesser-known historical sites and treasures in the Fredericksburg area.

Memorial Bricks Installed at Fredericksburg Battlefield

The CVBT has placed another set of memorial bricks in a small plaza on the Fredericksburg battlefield.

Two of them, purchased by CVBT Board member Lloyd Harrison, tell a rather tragic story. Two brothers, James Anthony Harrison and Pinckney McDowell Harrison, saw action with the Pee Dee Light Artillery, near Hamilton's Crossing, on 13 December 1862. During the fighting that day, one was killed in action and the other mortally wounded.

The family records note that the dead soldier was wrapped in Maxcy Gregg's blanket (who, apparently, had already been killed). Neither brother knew of the other's fate, however, and their older brother undertook the sad task of traveling to Virginia to bring them home.

Another brick, purchased by member Charles McDaniel, recognizes George Weedon, of the 4th Virginia Cavalry.

We are proud to be able to place bricks that recognize those who campaigned through this area.

If anyone is interested in memorializing an ancestor, please visit our website or write to us at the CVBT address.

A donation of \$100 will purchase a brick that can accommodate three lines of 14 characters each. The limited space can be a challenge, but the emotional impact of these bricks can be quite compelling.

Sunshine Lady Foundation Helps to Clean up Battlefield Land

Chancellor High School wrestlers provide the muscle

The Sunshine Lady Foundation has stepped forward again to help the CVBT fulfill its mission. The Trust's property at Smith Run has an old house on it, a deep well that needs to be capped, and what looks like decades of accumulated trash and equipment. Before this site can be interpreted and made accessible to the public, these hazards must be removed. Nearby development gave this task an added urgency as new houses usually include young children who could get hurt there.

On Saturday, June 7th, CVBT volunteers as well as a team of wrestlers from Chancellor High School, in Spotsylvania County, jumped in to handle this work

Preserving battlefield terrain often includes cleaning up elements that don't belong on hallowed ground. This work is arduous and messy, but usually quite rewarding.

Our thanks is due to our hard working volunteers, the strong young men of the Chancellor wrestling team, and of course the Sunshine Lady Foundation for providing the funding to handle these critical tasks.

As nature takes its course and gently covers the bare spots where trash and a house used to be, the evidence of all this labor will slowly disappear. The integrity of the overall site, however, has been restored, and the safety of those who will explore this ground has been enhanced. Thank you.
